Select Fellowships for Graduate Study

In the U.K. & Ireland:

Marshall Scholarship

Marshall Scholarships finance study for a degree in the U.K. at participating higher education institutions.

Mitchell Scholarship

The George J. Mitchell Scholarship supports individuals to complete a year-long graduate program or research in any discipline at an institution of higher learning in Ireland or Northern Ireland.

Gates Cambridge

Gates Cambridge Scholarships are awarded to outstanding applicants from countries outside the U.K. to pursue a full-time postgraduate degree in any subject available at the University of Cambridge.

Rhodes Scholarship

The Rhodes Scholarship promotes international understanding and peace by providing two-year graduate study at Oxford University in any field of study under an Oxford College.

In the United States:

Knight-Hennessy Scholarship

The Knight-Hennessy Scholarship is for three years of funding toward graduate education at Stanford University.

In France:

Michel David-Weill Scholarship

The Michel David-Weill Scholarship carries a monetary value of \$80,000 and covers the



cost of tuition and living expenses during a twoyear master's program at Sciences Po.

Award: Bell Scholarship

How did you hear about the Bell Scholarship and what inspired you to apply?

I heard about the Bell Scholarship through the LS Newsletters and my academic advisor promoting the opportunity. I was inspired by the Bell Scholarship's commitment to public service and goal of alleviating financial burdens. I've struggled with financial issues throughout my time here at NYU, and the Bell Scholarship offered a way to showcase my work as a student leader and move forward with paving for school.

Advice to other Bell applicants (or fellowship applicants in general)?

My main word of advice is not to be afraid to fail. I applied for the Bell Scholarship twice, and only on my second time did I get it. I remember feeling very discouraged after I didn't get the Bell Scholarship the first time. Still, after meeting with my advisor, Stephanie Santiago, and continuing to believe in my work, I overcame the fear of failing and applied again. In short, if you don't get it the first time, please try again—persistence is the key!

What types of public service initiatives did you take part in at NYU that factored into your getting chosen for this award?

Throughout my time at NYU, I was heavily involved with student government and leadership. Namely, I served as the Chief of Staff to the SGA, President of the Liberal Studies Student Council, and now I serve as Global Vice Chair of the SGA. In these roles, I centered much of my work around equity and student advocacy; more specifically, I worked with various admins to get students involved in the hiring and recruitment process at LS and NYU. I genuinely enjoyed this work and reflected on that fact in my application.

For students receiving a Pell Grant and planning to study abroad for the semester or academic year, we encourage you to consider applying for the <u>Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program</u> (sponsored by the U.S. Department of State).

- For Fall 2023 study, and the application deadline will be in March 2023
- Applicants must be US citizens enrolled at a U.S. institution and receiving a Pell Grant at the time of application or term abroad
